FRENCH - Summer Preparation

IGCSE French as a first language is a challenging subject with a part about a literary fiction text and another about non-fiction texts: you will need to ensure that your reading, comprehension and writing skills are strong, so reading regularly this summer is an effective way to improve your fluency.
